
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The Basic Guide To SuperVision And Instructional Leadership (3rd Edition) (Allyn & Bacon Educational Leadership)

Many books in education can be quite fluffy or ideological; this is neither. Of all the books in my grad school program in education that I was required to purchase, this is the one that I am sure i will use for reference most often. As an administrator, your primary job is instructional leadership - the book goes over in detail best practices for evaluation and discussion of the evaluation. I can say that it is relevant enough that even as a teacher it is worth purchasing this to find out how you will be evaluated and to be able to have better rapport with your supervisor because of awareness of the process of evaluation. I gave it four stars rather than five, because although it does the job quite well, it is not something that I or most others can be quite passionate about.

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Although it was a fairly older book in the field of school administration, it contains excellent resources to learn from and is an easy read! Glickman presents superior research, detailed examples in teacher evaluation process, and citation of dozens of other studies.

I bought this kindle substitute because I needed to start on my studies for class. It is just like the book. The downside is that it ONLY works on computers, which can be inconvienient. I ended up using it at work when I had extra time. If you have a laptop, and take it with you, I would recommend.... A lot cheaper than buying the book.

This book gives some insight about what a principal (or administrator) should do, but it lacks the realism that one faces in the actual practice. There are many theories and ideas, but some are just not practical. While it is good for training purposes, I would not recommend an administrator to try to do all of these practices. Additionally, the writing is rather stilted in some parts and the diagrams are often not helpful. Some of the figures are difficult to grasp and some are VERY dated. The research is also dated in some portions of the book. I would have liked to see the new edition have more updated research based information. Overall, the book is okay, but it is lacking in some areas.

This book is required for the course that I am taking -- Processes in Instructional Leadership. The text is clear and concise. The authors have visuals which help clarify various concepts throughout this basic guide. For an introductory resource, this one is a must. I would recommend this resource for anyone who is looking at becoming an educational leader, whether in the classroom, in the building, or in administration.

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
